MEMORANDUM FOR SEE DISTRUBTION

SUBJECT: United States Army Garrison, Policy #14, Standards of Dress and Prohibited Attire for Patrons of Garrison Services

1. PURPOSE: To inform patrons of Garrison Services, including MWR and Exchange outlets, of dress standards for utilization of those services.

2. APPLICABILITY: This policy applies to all military personnel on Fort Irwin and all others, including family members and contractors, who use Garrison Services or access Garrison facilities as patrons, except federal government employees on duty who are bound by the rules prescribed by their collective bargaining agreements.

4. POLICY: The purpose of this policy is to establish the required dress standards for military personnel on Fort Irwin and to provide uniformity in dress for patrons, military and nonmilitary, of Fort Irwin Garrison and tenant facilities. Individuals failing to meet prescribed dress standards may be refused admittance or service to facilities located on Fort Irwin.

a. All military personnel must wear the prescribed uniform of the day while conducting military business at Fort Irwin. Exceptions to wearing the prescribed uniform include the following: emergency situations, personnel in a leave status, and Soldiers on permissive TDY for residence hunting provided they have leave documentation in their possession. Also excepted from this policy are Soldiers whose medical profile precludes their ability to wear the prescribed uniform for the day. In this case, a clean Physical Training (PT) uniform is approved provided the Soldier has in his/her possession documentation relating to their profile.

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b. The mixing of uniforms is prohibited; the only items of military clothing acceptable for wear with civilian attire, without insignia or rank, are windbreakers, sweaters, black all-weather coats, and overcoats.

c. Sponsors are responsible for the appearance, attire, and conduct of their Family members and they too are expected to conform to acceptable standards of dress as outlined within this policy.

d. Soldiers subsisting in Fort Irwin dining facilities while in uniform must ensure their uniform is complete, clean, and neat. Headgear will not be worn and issue t-shirts, either white or brown in color, will not be worn as outer garments.

e. Wearing of the military uniform in dining facilities during such holidays as Thanksgiving and Christmas is at the discretion of the commander who may authorize a modified dress code for military personnel who wish to dine in civilian attire. The owning unit Commander is the final authority regarding interpretations of this dress code for holiday meals.

f. PT uniforms are authorized for wear in dining facilities when scheduled PT prevents Soldiers from being able to attend breakfast in the dining facility. PT gear is authorized in the fast food line only, Monday through Friday, to allow Soldiers time to pick up and take out their breakfast meal. Soldiers whose medical profile recognizes the PT uniform as their uniform of the day are permitted to eat their breakfast, lunch or dinner meal in a dining facility.

g. The wearing of civilian attire should be a matter of personal pride and care should be taken by all Soldiers, Family Members, retirees, civilians, and guests to ensure their clothing is clean, conservative, inoffensive, presentable and neat. Attire should be appropriate to the environment (ie. workout clothing or swimwear designed for the hot conditions of the summer heat is appropriate in the gymnasium, the pools or on the sports field but not in the PX or Chapel).

(1) Shoes, boots, or sandals/flip flops/shower shoes/Hawaiian slippers must be worn; bare feet are not allowed at any time, except at facilities such as the pool or splash park or when recreating at one of our many fields or parks.

(2) Clothing that includes obscene, vulgar, distasteful, slanderous or sexually suggestive language is prohibited. Additionally, attire that depicts drug paraphernalia or any illegal activity is not permitted.

(3) Clothing which makes disparaging comments concerning the Military or the United States Government may not be worn.

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(4) See-through garments and clothing which expose the midriff are not permitted except when working in hot conditions. Those garments may not be worn in restaurants or places of business.

(5) Underwear may not be worn as outerwear or be otherwise clearly visible. The wear of pajamas while frequenting any public establishment on this installation prohibited. Hair curlers/rollers may not be worn in public facilities.

(6) Trousers cannot sag or be cut off where pocket linings are visible.

(7) Short shorts and short skirts which expose the buttocks to public view are prohibited.

4. As an Army, we pride ourselves on standards, discipline and military bearing at all times. We should carry ourselves in such a manner as to bring pride to the profession and to respect and dignity to the community. As such, all leaders, in or out of uniform, should exercise general military authority to make on the spot corrections when necessary to correct infractions contradictory to this policy, to include pointing out violations of the policy to family members. While leaders should point out violations to family members, any enforcement of the standards should be left to the manager of the facility in which the family member is visiting.
